The Board of Education and district leadership engaged in nearly a two-year long process of community engagement to identify district needs and priorities. This outreach and data collection process resulted in the Board's adoption of a new 5-7 year Strategic Plan in December of 2020.

Broad District Directions are the cornerstone for priorities of each school within the district. The district has prioritized achievement in math and English Language Arts through rigorous curriculum development and instructional improvement. Safety and well-being, including mental health supports, is another student-focused priority within the plan. Results-focused priorities include preparing all students for postsecondary readiness by developing meaningful career pathways at the secondary level and increasing graduation rates for all students. Teacher development and retention is a major cornerstone within the plan which recognizes the strong correlation between teacher quality and student success.

Annually, each school develops action goals aimed at reaching each of the long-term District Directions. The full Strategic Plan can be found on the district's website.

- The average Re-3J graduation rate since 2017 is 82.9% compared to the average state rate in the same time period at 80.7%.

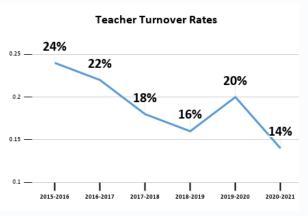


- Due to COVID-19, state assessments were suspended for the 2020 school year.

OUTSTANDING STAFF

Teacher quality is one of the strongest predictors of student achievement which makes the retention of quality teachers of critical importance. A strategic goal addressing teacher retention has been actively addressed for several years and is a significant part of the district's priorities in the Mill Levy Override. Competitive salary is a factor contributing to retention, and for the second year in a row, the district has exceeded a target of being 5th in starting salary when compared to a select group of regional school districts. Another contributing factor to teacher retention is job satisfaction. The district boasts an over 80% job satisfaction rate among all district staff. The district also

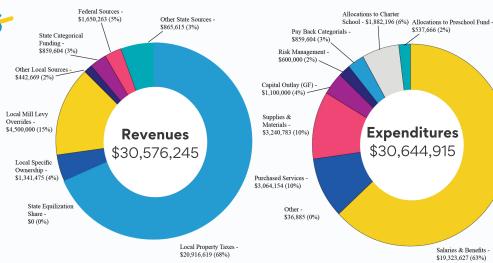

Re-3J Finances

In the midst of a pandemic and state budget crisis, the Re-3J community showed resounding support for the school district by passing the continuous renewal of the 2016 Mill Levy Override. These local funds contribute to district priorities and cannot be reduced by the State in any way. Specifically, MLO funds support student achievement and instructional programs, staff retention, technology initiatives, and facility maintenance/bus replacement.

District residents continue to benefit from the high assessed value of oil and gas properties. Taxpayers benefit from one of the lower mill levies in the State. The Re-3J total mills for the 2021 tax collection is 16.309. The Oil & Gas industry constitutes over 67% of total assessed valuation which means the industry contributes more than half of taxes received, resulting in comparably lower homeowner taxes. The increase in assessed value of oil and gas also helped the district curtail state budget reductions during the 2020-21 school year by "buying-out" of the Budget Stabilization factor in the state funding formula. This is a mechanism used by the state to cut funding to school districts.
